WSU Extension is offering an outstanding 2-day intensive program on producing quality beef called BEEF 200, **February 10-11**, in Okanogan, in the Agriplex building at the Okanogan County Fairgrounds. Leadership Council Meeting

December 12, 2011

President, Jeannie Sizemore, called the meeting to order at 6:38 PM in the Rock Creek Center.

A quorum was present. The minutes from the **December 12, 2011** meeting were read and approved with the suggestion to use last names in meeting minutes.

Treasurer's Report:

- Martha passed out the treasurer's report for January.
- Jeannie Sizemore was reimbursed for expenses from last May's mandatory horse meeting.
- \$400 was added to the State 4H Forum line item to cover the cost of leader of the year attending forum.
- Paid three bills to Glory Days.
- Martha went over each of the balances and explained how the treasurer's report is set up. The horse program has a separate line item because it costs a lot to run, and they earn money to cover their costs. We could add additional line items if necessary.
- There was a discussion about trophies. It would be helpful to know where trophy money comes from and how much money we spend each year for trophies. Also considered the number of trophies and rosettes that are handed out and how this has greatly increased from past years. May need to look at our process and establish some guidelines for trophies. It was suggested that kids could earn educational opportunities versus trophies in some cases.

Office Report:

- Sally Mansur passed out questions to be answered by participants during the meeting pertaining to the goals of WSU Extension and Leader's Council. She will continue to revisit our shared focus.
- Sally Mansur shared several upcoming trainings and events. There will be more information about these events in the Clover Reporter:
 - Washington swine information day on Feb. 3rd in Moses Lake

- Fair judges' training coming up in Puyallup
 - Goat education conference Feb. 25 at Clackamas Community College
 - Skagit County Country Living Expo and Cattlemen's Winterschool on Jan. 28th
 - Prairie Hatchers Poultry Show Feb. 25th at Clark County Fair Grounds
 - Columbia Gorge Camp Counselor training-various topics will be covered on the following dates: Jan. 22nd, Feb 5, 12, 26, and March 11th
- There are Birds of Washington calendars available. Sally Mansur will order them.
 - Sally Mansur shared information from Martha Suronen. We do not have a 4H delegate from Skamania attending Know Your Government. Skamania High School covers KYG, but we do not have anyone attending state KYG. Martha has not heard anything regarding the exchange program yet, but there should be an opportunity to host exchange students again this year.
 - Important information regarding market poultry: Anyone planning to do a market poultry project is required to buy their poultry from the market committee. All birds must be preordered by February 1st. Larry will get them in March. They will be cared for and banded and they will need to be picked up in April. Estimated cost is \$5 per chick and \$12 for turkeys. Larry explained that the market committee provides market birds to level playing field for all of our 4-H kids. The kids receive birds from similar stock and can be judged on how they care for their animals.
 - Please submit insurance money to Sally M. Clubs must pay \$1 for each member and leader. Adult volunteers also pay \$1 to be covered by insurance. Insurance is due Feb. 1st along with enrollments. Anyone who signs up after Feb. 1 can pay their \$1 when they join.
 - Sally M. shared that her position is funded for 3/4 time.

Exhibit Hall Report:

- There was no report from the exhibit hall.
- Sally Mansur is looking for a 4-H superintendent for the exhibit hall. She is hoping to have Sally Bea and will talk to Carmen Johnson about possibly working with Sally Bea.

Livestock Report:

- No new information.

Fair Board Report:

- Fair board will meet March 14th.
- Larry shared that the budget for fair will be tight this year. We will continue to get the state pass through money to operate the fair, however, we will lose some of the funding from Skamania County. They are looking at ways to cut back on expenses. Larry will ask superintendents to consider local or volunteer judges, etc. We may need to set up pens on work day and increase the amount of time we volunteer. There was discussion of adding duties to herdsmanship that would support the operation of the fair. We will also look at fundraising opportunities.
- Fair board will do 4th of July fireworks and use the money they earn to fund the fair fireworks.
- Sue Sampson said she has the opportunity to do bingo at Camas Days this year. This will be a good fundraiser. Sue Sampson will organize Camas Days bingo, but will need a lot of volunteers. If every family volunteered for 3 hours, it would be great. We could also have Bingo for two full days at fair, but will need someone to be in charge. We will need to have this figured out by March. We will also need lots of volunteers to work at bingo at the fair.

Old Business:

- Jeannie talked about Achievement Night. Many ideas were shared such as having our teens put on the program and go through the agenda. Very short presentations from guest speakers, clubs report on what they are doing. Achievement Night is a good time for kids to get together and share what they are doing so others can consider different project areas they may want to do. Jeannie volunteered to chair an Achievement Night committee that would look at ways to make it more meaningful. Sophia Sizemore,



 - Last year we accepted scrap metal donations. We will need someone to be in charge of this again.



Swine Offering:

Washington Swine Information Day

Washington Swine Information Day features an array of presentations that have been organized to meet the diverse and unique needs of Pacific Northwest swine producers. Topics at the day's event include balancing profitable rations using PNW feed sources, managing risk through livestock price protection insurance programs, animal disease traceability, and pork checkoff requirements for commercial, niche, and youth producers.

The morning featured topics will be factors influencing pork quality and taste for today's pork consumers. Mr. John Green, National Pork Board Director of Strategic Marketing, will present on the demographics and demands of both the U.S. and Export consumer. Dr. Jan Busboom, WSU Extension Meat Specialist, will follow with a presentation on management and production factors that influence the quality and taste of pork. Following the presentation, Dr. Busboom will conduct a taste test for participants showcasing pork raised under different production systems and different processing methods.

The afternoon session has been organized to feature topics of interest to the growing show pig interest in the PNW. Show pig topics include information on rules and requirements for importing and instate movement of pigs in Washington state, and transport, receiving and housing requirements for show pigs. The day will conclude with featured show pig speaker Jayme Albrecht, regionally recognized swine judge, speaking on how to train, prepare and show a champion show pig.

Upon request, agencies must provide auxiliary aids and services, such as interpreters for non-English speaking, hearing impaired, and/or large print or Braille documents for vision impaired. In determining type of auxiliary and/or service, agencies must give primary consideration to the individual's request.
